



### F-15C EAGLE DEMONSTRATION



















## Northeast Region, CAP Glider Orientation Flights, Summer Hartness State Airport, Springfield, Vermont

AP glider flights provide cadets with an opportunity to learn about the aerodynamics of flight at its most basic level. There is no engine to help you as you soar through the air, making your way to ground level.

Within a CAP glider, the cadet sits in the front seat while the pilot-in-command sits in the back. A CAP tow pilot, utilizing a tow rope connected to the body of the glider, pulls the glider into the air. Once adequate altitude is attained, the tow rope is released. The glider and its pilot and co-pilot utilize currents of rising air, called thermals, as well as other weather phenomena, to gradually soar back down to ground level.

Every summer, Civil Air Patrol offers National Cadet Special Activties (NCSAs). One popular NCSA is the Glider Academy.

This is offered to cadets aged 14 years and up, and is offered at locations throughout the nation.


